The Rich Young Man

"Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

"Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." (Mark 10:17-30)



In the Gospel story of the rich young man (Sunday 14 October), Jesus tells us how difficult it is to enter the Kingdom of Heaven when we have many possessions. Possessions can sometimes get in the way of loving others. This is the lesson that Grandad shared with his Grandson in the story

of "Grandad's Treasure".

However, no matter our age – whether we are a young child with toys, an older child with gadgets or an adult with responsibilities – letting go of the security that can be found in material goods can be difficult. Indeed, it was difficult for the disciples in this Gospel passage too. Jesus knows this. He appreciates the internal struggle that we all face at times with the quest for
